FIRST NATIONAL BANK OF NEW CARLISLE, IND.

The SPEAKER also laid before the House the following message from the President of the United States, which was read: To the House of Representatives:

I am returning herewith, without my signature, H. R. 8881, An Act for the relief of the First National Bank of New Carlisle, Indiana. This measure, if it became law, would appropriate out of the Public Treasury the sum of \$923.25 to pay the First National Bank of New Carlisle for war savings stamps and thrift stamps stolen from the bank. It would transfer to the United States the risk of loss on unregistered stamps for which the bank was responsible and which it held in its own custody at its own risk. It would involve the use of public funds to relieve a private banking institution of the consequences of its own misfortune. The stamps in question were unregistered and could not be identified, so that in any event
